#### **Kareem Ibrahim:**

# "Urban Inequality in Cairo: Re-framing the Debate about the City"

This presentation sheds some light on the recent efforts of <u>TADAMUN</u>: <u>The Cairo</u> <u>Urban Solidarity Initiative</u> to re-frame our understanding of Cairo and its problems through focusing on the local level, improved access to public data and alternative methods of

interdisciplinary analysis. It will also investigate how understanding of the city's urban inequalities and disparities can change our perspective on urban development priorities.



The presentation will illustrate TADAMUN's latest research endeavor – <u>Planning [in] Justice</u> – and its efforts to shift the discourse on Cairo's neighborhoods from the formal/informal or planned/unplanned rhetoric, to a grounded deliberation on real community needs, levels of deprivation, and claims for social justice and more equitable distribution of public resources. It will also demonstrate how Planning [in] Justice struggles to foster better accountability and transparency - enabling citizens to play a more effective role in the management of their city.

## "Mapping Social Injustice in the Built Environment. The 2015/2016 Budget (Egypt)"

In the absence of integrated local development plans, vague legislation on development and a highly centralised and sectoral government, how can one monitor response to build environment issues? The analysis of the built environment budget provides insights into the sectoral and geographic distribution of budgets allocated to housing, infrastructure, transport and urban development, revealing the main sectors of importance and the disparities they generate.
